

Rules

● **Wear masks at all times**

When you are playing in a game, wear your mask. Most severe paintball injuries occur because someone removed their mask during game play (such as clearing a fogged mask).

● **No Alcohol Allowed (No Exception to this Rule)**

● **Kill Shots**

A "Kill Shot" will be defined as ANY paintball hitting and breaking open, leaves paint on a player (this includes "friendly fire" incidents). If a shot bounces off, it is not a kill shot. Paint splatter from paintballs breaking on bunkers, bushes, etc. is not a kill shot. If shots strike multiple players at roughly the same time, all are out. When you "die", raise your marker above your head and walk out to the playing area. An eliminated player cannot shoot while leaving the field, nor are they to be shot at.

● **No Blind Firing**

Don't shoot what you can't see. Many players are tempted to stick their guns out and fire around corners without looking. Blind firing can lead to accidentally shooting players who are leaving the field, referees, or other players at point-blank ranges.

● **Safety Kills**

Close-range shots are considerably more painful than shots from a distance. If you find yourself within 15 feet of an opposing player, offer them the chance to surrender by shouting "Safety-Kill". They have the option of surrendering or firing on you. If they attempt to fire, they are fair game. If they raise their hands in surrender, let them to go to their dead zone.

● **Marker Calibration**

All markers are required to keep velocities under 280 feet per second (FPS). Gun speeds are calibrated with a paintball chronograph, and should be carefully monitored. A paintball that travels at 280 FPS can cause small bruises, while a paintball that travels faster can cause significantly more damage including severe welts and broken skin.

● **Barrel Plugs**

Whenever masks are not being worn, all guns should be on safe and blocked with a barrel plug or barrel sock. Unless everyone has a mask on, do not take out your barrel plugs.

● **Common Sense**

Most problems can be avoided if you use common sense. Don't shoot private property. Don't shoot out of a moving vehicle. Don't look down the barrel of a loaded gun. Don't shoot yourself, etc. If you ever wonder if something might be a good idea, it's not.
